

## Substance Use Disorder Rehabilitation Facilities (SUDRFs) Certification Process

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### **1.0 ISSUE**

SUDRFs certification.

### **2.0 DESCRIPTION**

SUDRFs shall operate primarily for the purpose of providing treatment of substance use disorders (on either an inpatient (including partial care) or an outpatient basis). An inpatient substance use rehabilitation facility is a facility, or distinct part of a facility, that provides medically monitored, interdisciplinary addiction-focused treatment to beneficiaries who have psychoactive substance use disorders. Qualified health care professionals provide 24-hour, seven-days-per-week, medically monitored assessment, treatment, and evaluation. An inpatient rehabilitation center is appropriate for patients whose addiction-related symptoms, or concomitant physical and emotional/behavioral problems reflect persistent dysfunction in several major life areas. A partial hospitalization center for the treatment of substance use disorders is an addiction-focused service that provides active treatment to adolescents between the ages of 13 and 18 or adults aged 18 or over. Partial hospitalization is a generic term for day, evening, or weekend programs that treat patients with psychoactive substance use disorders according to a comprehensive, individualized, integrated schedule of care. Partial hospitalization is appropriate for those whose addiction-related symptoms or concomitant physical and emotional/behavioral problems can be managed outside the hospital environment for defined periods of time with support in one or more of the major life areas. Such programs shall be accredited by and shall remain in substantial compliance with standards issued by either the Joint Commission under the Comprehensive Accreditation Manual for Behavioral Healthcare, or the Commission on Accreditation Rehabilitation Facilities as an alcoholism and other drug dependency rehabilitation program under the Standards Manual for Organizations Serving People with Disabilities, or other designated standards approved by the Director, Defense Health Agency (DHA).

### **3.0 POLICY**

**3.1** The TRICARE Quality Management Contract (TQMC) is the certifying authority for new applicants for status as an approved institutional provider for SUDRFs. Separate certification is not required for authorized hospital units which are a distinct part of an authorized facility. Effective October 1, 1995, the SUDRF is not considered an authorized provider, and benefits are not paid for services provided until the date upon which a participation agreement is signed.

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**3.2** Substance use disorder rehabilitation programs, except substance use disorder rehabilitation programs provided in units which are a distinct part of an authorized hospital, must fully comply, be certified and enter into a participation agreement.

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
